39th Annual Iranian Mathematics Conference

The 39th Annual Iranian Mathematics Conference (AIMC) was an international conference and a great get together of world mathematicians, organized by Iranian Mathematics Society. This conference was held at Shahid Bahonar University, Kerman (Iran) during August 24 - 27, 2008.

Ms. Kahkashan Iqbal was representing Pakistan Air Force - Karachi Institute of Economics and Technology (PAF-KIET), Pakistan, financially supported by Higher Education Commission and she presented her joint paper "WHEN IS THE CENTER OF A NEAR-RING ITS' SUBNEAR-RING?" with Dr. Sarwar J. Abbasi, Professor at Department of Mathematics, University of Karachi.

As an academician, Ms. Iqbal observed that although it was an international conference and participants were representing Japan, Spain, Canada and Pakistan but the language of the conference was Persian, Iran's national language. Only the foreigners presented their papers in English. This did not mean that Iranian academicians

were not aware of English but it indicated that they took care of their nationals first and demonstrated in Persian so that their students get more and more benefit from the conference. Their use of Persian language so frequently spoke high of their national love and independence. All of their universities reading books are in Persian. Many Iranian and even Arab students were interested to come to Pakistan to pursue doctorate in Mathematics but were looking forward for a scholarship. Iranian doctorates were majority foreign qualified but then they are serving Iran.

Being the only Muslim foreigner there, Ms. Iqbal had the honor of being interviewed by two university students of Shahid Bahonar University. This interview will very soon be published in their student magazine "Zindigi-e-Jihadi" (in Persian language).

Ms. Iqbal is extremely thankful to Higher Education Commission, Pakistan for providing financial assistance without which her presence in such a wonderful conference would have not been possible.

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Language Teaching and Learning: Meeting the Realities of a Changing World

Third International Language Learning Conference (ILLC) 2008 Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM), Malaysia

This century is witnessing a crucial role of language in the progress of nations. Current global developments have necessitated a re-examination and revision of past and current practices in the light of classroom pedagogy and methodology. This calls for a paradigm shift in the way language teaching and learning is conceived and conceptualized as a rapidly changing world creating new challenges and demands that impact on classroom practices and needs. There are new demands on language teachers with regards to, the needs of learners, new technologies, cross-cultural factors, methodologies and pedagogy, critical thinking vis-à-vis the knowledge-economy and multi-literacies.

It is imperative, therefore, that educators and institutions take cognizance of global developments and changing needs and integrate them into current pedagogical and methodological frameworks such that, on the one hand, the specific of local communities are catered for, while on the other hand, they are equipped with the necessary knowledge and skills to meet the challenges and engage effectively with a borderless, rapidly changing world scenario.

The 3rd ILLC 2008 held on 29 October 2008, organized

by the Centre of Languages and Translation, USM, therefore aimed to address the above points by providing a platform for educators, institutions and interested parties to discuss and highlight the needs and concomitant changes that need to be made in order that we may address the realities of a changing world and prepare learners to meet these changes.

It was a great pleasure for me to be the only presenter from Pakistan among the 130 presenters from different parts of the world in the three-day conference, which was held in Penang—the natural heritage of Malaysia and known for her emerald green hills, golden sandy beaches, exotic cuisines and surprisingly sweet dishes. I presented a paper entitled 'A rating scale to assess English speaking proficiency of university students in Pakistan'.

The keynote speakers, Dr Kondoh from Japan, Dr Kell from New Zealand, and Dr Dom and Dr Pandian from USM, Malaysia, concluded that language is the integral part of identity, which should be intact even enhanced with language teaching encouraging learners to the emerging world of knowledge-based economy.

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
